

“Crossing the Line”

Tell me, What has been your most memorable Easter?

For me, my most memorable Easter took place twenty years ago in 2000, onboard a U.S. Naval Ship, USNS SPICA (T-AFS 9), in the Pacific Ocean at Latitude: 00 Degree, 00', 00"; and Longitude: 145 Degrees, 00', 00" East. I famously crossed the “Line,” the Equator. In Navy tradition, I was considered a “Pollywog,” a sailor or mariner who had never sailed across the Equator. When our ship came upon the Equator Line all Pollywogs were gathered and escorted by Shellbacks, seafarers who previously had crossed the Equator, to the Captain of the ship. There we stood before the Captain with a message being read aloud how His Imperial Majesty, King Neptune (the mythological god of the seas), heard of our ship’s presence and demanded a counting of all Pollywogs. King Neptune ordered the ship’s Captain to hand over all Pollywogs to his royal staff of Trusty Shellbacks, and to make ready for the Crossing of the Line Ceremony upon Easter morning. I recalled being awakened by King Neptune’s band of Trusty Shellbacks at 2401 (one minute past midnight), dragged out of my rack (bed), marched to the ship’s main deck where under the bright celestial stars and moon I was fully sprayed down by one of the ship’s fire hoses on full blast for my morning shower. After my cold, salty, water shower I was hauled before King Neptune’s Royal Sea Court Judge and Jury where I was charged and convicted of heinous sea crimes. One heinous crime I was charged with was making King Neptune rise earlier than his normal wake-up time, because we crossed the Line on Easter morning. King Neptune knew I was a chaplain and that meant he and his entourage would have to finish up the Crossing of the Line Ceremony and depart from the ship before Divine Services at 1000 (10:00 a.m.). To say the least, King Neptune and his Trusty Shellbacks were not happy with the chaplain in starting the Crossing of the Line Ceremony so early in the morning.

Every ship crossing the Equator will make its Line Ceremony memorable for their Pollywogs with humor, laughter, crying, joy, madness, pain, suffering, nasty tasks and ordeals, and cheerfulness when the initiation is all over after kissing King Neptune’s belly button. Of all the things we did to work off our heinous crimes, King Neptune and his Trusty Shellbacks gave us a break and celebrated Easter in their own way with the rising of the sun on Easter morning. The sunrise service began with a Royal Easter Egg Party. We Pollywogs had to dye King Neptune’s Easter eggs with our entire bodies by jumping into different pools of colored water. Later we had to roll the eggs down the entire length of the ship’s deck and back on our hands and knees with our noses. There is nothing worse than scratching your nose on a rough, cold, steel deck, as well as having your leggings slowly torn to shreds. We Pollywogs made Easter baskets out of our wet t-shirts to hold our newly dyed eggs. Of course, after King Neptune’s Easter Egg Hunt was over, his Trusty Shellbacks had us crack these rotten eggs over each other’s heads. That was my most memorable Easter in my life up to this point.

As I look back on Easter 2000, I remember many of King Neptune’s Royal Court sat in chapel later to celebrate Easter with joy and praise. These tired Royal Trusty Shellbacks imparted upon me what camaraderie and community meant on Easter morning on the high seas. You see, each one of us onboard that ship were separated physically from our loved ones back home where ever home was for each sailor and mariner. For me, my home was thousands of miles away in Yokohama, Japan with Jane. Knowing we were all separated from our loved ones on Easter, we knew we were not separated from God’s family in Christ Jesus. As Scripture tells us in Romans: “...nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.” (Rom. 8:39)

I get the feeling Easter 2020 will be memorable for all of us. We have crossed the Line in facing the COVID-19 pandemic. We are God’s Trusty Shellbacks. A Trusty Shellback of King Neptune’s Court is traditionally looked upon as a person who possesses nautical wisdom. As Christian Shellbacks we possess divine wisdom bringing hope and joy to those who are anxious and stressed. Our Lord tells us not to be afraid for he is with us (Isaiah 43:1-5). Continue to take courage in the Gospels’ Easter message of Jesus’ resurrection. Death is conquered. Life is everlasting.

This is our Easter message of hope and joy to a world crossing the pandemic Line of disease and death.

Proclaim the Good News: Jesus Christ is Risen! Hallelujah! Hallelujah! Hallelujah!

Due to the Corona virus (COVID-19) church services have been cancelled for a few weeks. Please bring all food items for the Community Food Pantry to the church during office hours on Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. This pantry service is needed to help local residents and we want to help with this cause. This pantry is located at SS Francis and Clare Catholic Church in Birch Run. Once regular church services resume, you may bring your food items each time we observe communion. The area for drop off will be at the South entrance door. Here are some of the suggested items they can use: Chicken soup, tomato soup, canned chicken, canned tuna fish, ramen noodles, juices, instant potatoes (box or pouch), scallop potatoes (box), Zataran rice and beans, Rice-A-Roni, canned peas and canned carrots. The expiration date on all items need to be current. If you prefer, you can use a pew envelope to make a contribution. Please note on the envelope “FOOD PANTRY” and this will help the pantry purchase items like milk, eggs and bread. Hunger never takes a vacation so our help is greatly needed.

News from the Clerk's Desk

The following items were discussed and approved at the March 10th Session Meeting.

- ◇ Approved the change of Fellowship Hall capacity from 150 to 133 people in the Building and Facilities Usage Policy.
- ◇ Building and Grounds Committee installed a new sump pump in the manse and Pete McIntosh installed the new plates and handles on the Fellowship Hall doors. Thank you, Pete!
- ◇ The session members all chose rooms in the church to clean. Each chosen room is to be cleaned by Mother's Day, May 10.
- ◇ There will be new prayer cards to fill out on Sunday. We will be printing these ourselves. All requests will be picked up at the start of church.
- ◇ Looking into ordering larger print Bibles for the Sunday School children and additional pew pads for church attendance.
- ◇ Fish Fry menu is simplified. Fried fish, French fries, coleslaw, roll, lemon dessert, and beverages. We are adding lemonade and removing baked potatoes from the menu.
- ◇ Volunteers are needed for both the fish fry day and for clean up the day after. Volunteer hours will be given out to any students who help during and after the Fish fry. Next Dinner Committee meeting is on Sunday, March 22, 2020.
- ◇ Taymouth Church is now on Twitter and Instagram.

The following items were discussed and approved at March 14th Special Session Meeting.

- ◇ Approved to cancel worship service and all events until Easter Sunday morning, including the Easter Egg Hunt, Lenten services, committee meetings, etc.
- ◇ Approved to have only one service on Easter Sunday morning at 9:30 with communion prepared and served with non-latex gloves with everyone coming to the front. No Easter breakfast, donuts or coffee will be served after.
- ◇ Approved to have Elders reach out to congregation members using the emergency call list with information provided from Pastor.
- ◇ Agreed to cancel the Fish Fry for this year and to postpone Confirmation class until the fall.
- ◇ Agreed to re-evaluate all church activities and worship services on April 7, 2020, at 7 p.m. to take the place of our regular session meeting on April 14, 2020.
- ◇ Approve the exploration and establishment of a virtual worship platform via live streaming, YouTube and social media to reach out to the congregations and our community.
- ◇ Office will remain open during regular business hours.
- ◇ Funeral and memorial services are at the discretion of Pastor with the support and resources of Presbytery and local officials.


