
EASTER LILIES & SPRING FLOWERS

“Easter People”

You may recall from time to time how I refer to our church’s congregation as being an Easter people. The basis for this reference comes from a parable called “The Rabbi’s Gift.” I would like to share this short story with you.

“The Rabbi’s Gift” (The following abbreviated version of the story comes from The Rev. Francis Dorff (www.fumcmanchester.org) and a longer version can be found in the book, Stories for the Journey: A Sourcebook for Christian Story-Tellers, MN: Augsburg Publishing House, pp. 108-110):

There was a famous monastery which had fallen on very hard times. Formerly, its many buildings were filled with young monks and its big church resounded with the singing of the chant. But now it was deserted. People no longer came there to be nourished by prayer. A handful of old monks shuffled through the cloisters and praised God with heavy hearts.

On the edge of the monastery woods, an old rabbi had built a little hut. He would come to the monastery from time to time to fast and pray. No one ever spoke with him, but whenever he appeared the word would be passed from monk to monk: “The rabbi walks in the woods. The rabbi walks in the woods.” And for as long as the rabbi was there, the monks would feel sustained by his prayerful presence.

One day the abbot decided to visit the rabbi and to open his heart to him. So, after morning vespers, the abbot set through the woods, and as he approached the hut, the abbot saw the rabbi standing in the doorway, his arms outstretched in welcome. It was as though he had been waiting there for some time. The two embraced like long-lost brothers. Then they stepped back and just stood there, smiling at one another with smiles their faces could hardly contain.

After a while, the rabbi motioned the abbot to enter. In the middle of the room was a wooden table with scriptures open on it. They sat there for a moment, in the presence of the Word. Then the rabbi began to cry. The abbot could not contain himself. He covered his face with his hands and began to cry, too. For the first time in his life, he cried his heart out. The two men sat there like lost children, filling the hut with their sobs, and wetting the Word with their tears.

After the tears had ceased to flow and all was quiet again, the rabbi lifted his head. “You and your brothers are serving God with heavy hearts,” he said. “You have come to ask a teaching of me. I will give you a teaching, but you can only repeat it once. After that, no one must ever say it aloud again.”

The rabbi looked straight at the abbot and said, “The Messiah is among you.” For a while, all was silent. Then the rabbi said, “Now you can go home!” The abbot left without a word and without looking back.

The next morning, the abbot called his monks together in the chapel. He told them he had received a teaching from “the rabbi who walks in the woods” and that this teaching was never again to be spoken aloud. The he looked at each of the monks and said, “The rabbi said that one of us is the Messiah.”

The monks were startled by this saying. “What could it mean?” they asked themselves. Is Brother John the Messiah? Or Father Matthew? Or Brother Thomas? Am I the Messiah? What could this mean?” They were all deeply puzzled by the rabbi’s teaching. But no one ever mentioned it again.

As time went by, the monks began to treat one another with a very special reverence. There was a gentle, wholehearted, human quality about them now which was hard to describe but easy to notice. They lived with one another as people who had finally found something. They prayed the scriptures together always looking for something new. Occasional visitors found themselves deeply moved by the life of these monks and were asking again to live with the monks for a lifetime.

In those days, the rabbi no longer walked in the woods. His hut had fallen into ruins. But, somehow or other, the old monks who had taken his teaching to heart still felt sustained by his prayerful presence. They still felt sustained by his prayerful presence...”

When I first heard this story many years ago on Easter morning, I was asked to embrace the Easter power of the resurrection of Jesus Christ with these words: “The Messiah is among us!” Being an Easter people is to embrace the ever-living Messiah, Jesus Christ, and to treat all people reverently and with dignity. I invite you to go out into the world in peace; have courage; hold on to what is good; return no one evil for evil; strengthen the fainthearted; support the weak, and help the suffering; honor everyone; love and serve the Lord, rejoicing in the power of the Holy Spirit. (I Cor. 16:13, II Tim. 2:1, Eph. 6:10, I Thess. 5:13-22, I Peter 2:17).
