## BEANS, BEANS, BEANS

I want to wish everyone a Happy New Year eating a bowl of your favorite beans! A family tradition of mine is to cook and serve beans on New Year's Day. This tradition has been with me since childhood when I watched my mom cook a big pot of ham and beans. I still can still smell and taste those navy beans laden with smoked ham-hocks. Mighty tasty.

Knowing I could never duplicate my mother's cooking I begin to discover my own favorite New Year's bean dish tradition. I began to experiment with all sorts of beans: navy beans, black beans, red beans, pinto beans, kidney beans, lima beans, great Northern beans, and black-eyed peas to only name a few variety of beans. Now, of course I have had some help along the way in exploring the fine art of cooking beans. My wife, Jane, has been a tremendous help, as well as, my other help-mate, The Joy of Cooking, written by Irma S. Rombauer, Marion Rombauer Becker, and Ethan Becker (1997, Scribner, Simon & Schuster Inc.).

The one thing I notice in reading this particular cookbook, like reading the Bible, is that I can read and reread the same recipes over and over and still discover something new. In the closing month of 2021, I discovered a new way of soaking dried beans:

Our preferred soaking method is to heat the soaking water, which hastens the swelling of the beans. For a gentle quick-soak, pour boiling water over the beans to cover by 2 inches, cover, let stand until the beans have swelled to at least twice their size and have absorbed most of the water, and then drain, discarding the soaking liquid. This will take at least an hour and possibly longer, but the beans will remain firm and keep their shape when cooked. (The Joy of Cooking, p. 271)

Now, I recognize this method of soaking beans may not be new to some of you. But for someone like me who reads and rereads the same words, the same cooking methods and recipes, from a cookbook which I have owned since 1997, and which I consider it to be my "go to" cookbook, there comes an epiphany moment in cooking. Wow! What a discovery! It works!

Reading familiar biblical passages over and over is like rereading cookbook recipes. It brings about new discoveries. I am amazed I find new ways of looking into familiar biblical stories and discover for the first time a brand new insight interpreting the meaning of God's Word. During this past Advent and Christmas seasons, I discovered in rereading the familiar words, "Do Not Be Afraid," (Luke 1:13, Luke 1:30, Luke 2:10) instilled a sense of calmness and tranquility upon me in the midst of change.

I expect our New Year, 2022, will be somewhat like the last two years where change will occur for the better and for the worse. Change will teach us how to cope with both the known and unknown. I anticipate our society will continue meeting change with apprehension and anxiety, especially, in the midst of coming to grips with the COVID-19 pandemic and its effects upon the economy and politics. The same can be said towards global warming, especially, regarding the western part of the Unites States which continues to experience massive drought, numerous forest fires, and the drying of the Colorado River basin. Although we will continue to face many challenges and changes in the 2022 New Year, Scripture tells us, "Do Not Be Afraid."

Believe it or not, the phrase, "Do Not Be Afraid," appears often in the Bible. The best every day advice Jesus gives us is found in the Gospel of Luke (12:22-34) when he basically tells us "Do not be afraid, little flock, for your Father has been pleased to give you the kingdom." (Luke 12:32)

Bon appetite in feasting on God's Word in God's Kingdom with a bowl of beans.

The following items were discussed and approved at December's Session meeting:

### PER CAPITA

Near the close of the year, we begin looking at our finances and budget. One of the largest portions to take care of is the Per Capita. As of this printing, we have collected \$2,188.84 needed of our total due \$3,911.36. Balance remaining to collect is \$1722.52. If you have not already done so, please prayerfully consider making your per capita contribution by December 31.

#### WHAT IS PER CAPITA?

PER CAPITA has been part of our funding history for over 150 years. When presbyteries, synods, and the General Assembly meet, they are conducting the legislative and judicial business of the church and incur necessary expenses. There are also some necessary administrative expenses involved which enable these ecclesiastical, legislative, and judicial functions to be performed. Historically, per capita has been used to fund these. Importantly, per capita funding enables governing councils to make decisions regarding distribution of mission dollars without itself being funded by those same dollars.

The whole church shares in these expenses since everyone who is a member shares in the benefits of this system of church government. Per capita provides for the financial participation of all local churches as part of a connectional and representative church, thus providing for unity and mutual responsibility within the church.

### HOW IS PER CAPITA CALCULATED?

The Per Capita Apportionment in the Presbytery of Lake Huron is based on a portion of certain salaries and expenses which are part of the operating expenses of the Presbytery.

Per Capita is the cost of being a Presbyterian, and if each member pays the per capita amount above his/her pledge or regular giving, pressure on the local budget is reduced.

#### Paying per capita is similar to:

- contributing one's dish to a potluck meal
- paying to be connected to the internet
- paying for the benefit of utilities, like electricity, gas, water
- pitching in with others to pay for gasoline on a road trip In order to keep presbytery's per capita rate from escalating the per capita portion of the budget is subsidized with a distribution from Presbytery's investments.

### WHERE DO OUR PER CAPITA DOLLARS GO?

The amount that is set for per capita apportionment is a calculation based on the number of church members and the budget established annually by each governing body. At the presbytery level per capita pays for a number of items including:

- the mortgage payment on the presbytery office
- the office of the Stated Clerk including his salary and that of the Recording Clerk
- salaries of the Financial Secretary, Treasurer and the Administrative Assistant
- insurance coverage, legal counsel, annual audit
- costs associated with operating the presbytery office
- meeting costs for our standing units

### **STEWARDSHIP**

Dear Church Family and Friends!

The Finance committee met in December and then Session approved a couple of new changes for the coming year. First, I will not be printing giving statements every quarter. We are going to only distribute them twice a year, June and the end of December. We are hoping to save on postage, paper, etc. However, if at any time you would like a statement, please call me and I would be happy to get you one.

Next, after this year, you will not see a building fund or special offering/parking lot envelope in your box of envelopes. The hope is to redirect funds to the general fund and reduce the deficit more efficiently.

At our regular Session meeting in November, Session members voted to defer our 2022 Per Capita total due of \$3219.00 into twelve monthly payments of \$268.25. This deferment plan will help alleviate the Per Capita commitment and give time for everyone to make their donation. The 2022 Per Capita amount per member is \$29.00. Thank you all for your prayerful giving!
