"What?" you ask yourself, "Did Johnny Appleseed, the Nineteenth Century folklore hero who gave people apple seeds to grow orchards on the American frontier, really write a gospel?" No, Johnny Appleseed didn't write a gospel-like the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. He didn't write letters either like the Apostle Paul or the Apostle Peter. Johnny Appleseed spoke the Gospel by living it out daily. History records depict John Chapman, a.k.a. Johnny Appleseed, walking the American frontier barefoot wearing a minimal amount of clothing made of burlap sacks and a metal pot serving as a hat and cookware. Some American folklorists characterize Johnny Appleseed as a "John the Baptist" of the Allegheny River and the Ohio River Valleys.

Folk legend says when Johnny Appleseed approached pioneers, he would share the Gospel and listen to their concerns. After listening, he would open his Bible, tear out a page of Scripture, and hand it to them so they could reflect upon how God's Word could help them resolve their issues and problems. (Hays, Planetary Pilgrim, p. 154)

Johnny Appleseed's evangelistic and missionary endeavors were supported by his family and the family's church, New Church (a.k.a. Church of Swedenborg). Johnny Appleseed's missionary efforts were not just confined to white settlers but to Native Americans who looked upon him as a peace-maker between them and the ever-increasing presence of American settlements dotting the frontier in the Old Northwest Territory. Also, he was a vegetarian and an animal rights advocate. (The History Channel Website)

Johnny Appleseed's life mission and legend are two-fold: (1) Nourish people by inspiring them to grow apple orchards; and (2) Nurture people by giving them a page of Holy Scripture to chew on to resolve life's problems. My spiritual questions to you in honor of the man who promoted apple pies and apple cider is "What page of Scripture do you think you need to reflect upon today?" or "What fitting page in the Bible would Johnny Appleseed tear out for you to chew on spiritually?" Think about it as you take a bite of an apple pie or drink a refreshing glass of good old hard apple cider.

PRESBYTERY UPDATE ON THE DELTA VARIANT

As sessions and congregations continue to address the reality of COVID-19, questions continue to abound: "How important are masks if everyone is vaccinated?", "How should we protect our children?", "When can our choirs safely meet and sing in wor-ship?", "How much more dangerous are the new variants of the virus?", "What is the latest CDC advice, and how reliable is it?".

To paraphrase Albert Einstein, the Delta variant has changed everything but our way of thinking. Infections, hospitalizations, and deaths are rising again. Vaccination minimizes the effects, but breakthrough infections can occur. To address these changing factors, the Presbytery is pleased to host a new interactive discussion on Covid-19 and Congregations **on Tuesday, October 5 from 2:00 to 3:30** p.m. via Zoom. Our special guest once again is Lisa Allgood, Ph.D., who has served for 37 years as a Research Immunologist and is currently the Executive Presbyter for the Presbytery of Cincinnati. Lisa is an outstanding resource for understanding the scientific and medical dimensions of the current pandemic and their implications for congregational worship and ministry. Her expertise has been generously shared with the wider church. Executive Presbyter Dan Saperstein will moderate the presentation and the conversation that follows.


