## "A Slice of Rhubarb Pie"

Common catch phrases for spring include April showers bring May flowers, and March comes in like a lion and out like a lamb. For me, it is all about an offer for a taste of rhubarb pie.

At the first sign of spring I would hear my mother ask, "Do you want a slice of rhubarb pie?" I would every year, emphatically reply, "No"! My mom ate her pie, and also freshly picked rhubarb from our garden. She enjoyed raw stalks, dipped in sugar. I can say with confidence her fondness of rhubarb bordered on an addiction.

Rhubarb is an interesting plant. Botanically it is a vegetable related to sorrel and buckwheat with origins in China. It was traded on the Silk Road primarily as a medicinal agent. After being introduced to America colonists with access to sugar it became a popular New England pie. Rhubarb grows best in colder climates and is one of the first plants harvested in spring. It remains a favorite food to this day.

When will enjoy your first slice of spring—a rhubarb pie? As for me, I will have a small bite to celebrate the season.


