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THE FLAVORS AND AROMAS OF BIBLICAL COOKING

Lately, I have been viewing different cooking shows on YouTube including one called "Eighteenth Century Cooking" by James Townsend. Mr. Townsend, dressed in eighteenth century garb, introduces his show with the words, "Welcome, let us enjoy the flavors and aromas of eighteenth century cooking," and off we go to experience just that. Mr. Townsend is my latest joy in appreciating the culinary arts.

The only thing better than watching someone else cook is to cook yourself. I am constantly pulling a cookbook or two from my bookshelves at home mapping my next culinary adventure. Of course, I have my favorite cookbooks and recipes to capture the flavors and aromas of home cooking, as well as, biblical cooking. Yes, one of my favorite cookbooks is the Bible.

I have always viewed the Bible as a mysterious cookbook. There are some clear and not so clear recipes written in the Bible. One clear recipe can be found in Book of Ezekiel (4:9a): "And you, take wheat and barley, beans and lentils, millet and spelt; put them into one vessel and make bread for yourself." Now, what is not so clear about this simple recipe is the specific method of baking. There needs to be some thought, interpretation, and clarity on our part in knowing how to make this bread. Over the course of time bakers have done this. Today, a person can easily purchase a loaf of "Ezekiel Bread" or sprouted grain bread at a favorite grocery store or bakery.

A not so clear Bible recipe is one in which several scriptural passages are used to give clues to a recipe's ingredients. Such a recipe comes in an eighteenth century cookbook titled, "Colonial Christmas Cooking," written and published by Patricia B. Mitchel, 2019, Bookshelf Edition, pp. 92-93. She calls this recipe "Biblical Fruitcake," or "Scripture Cake." The recipe is as follows:

INGREDIENTS:

1/2 cup Almonds (Genesis 43:11)
1 cup Raisins (I Samuel 30:12)
1 cup Figs (I Samuel 30:12)
2 cups Flour (I Kings 4:22)
3 Eggs, separated (Isaiah 10:14)
1 1/2 cups Sugar (Jeremiah 6:20)

BIBLICAL FRUITCAKE

1/2 cup Butter (Judges 5:25)
1/2 tsp each of Cinnamon, Mace, and Cloves (I Kings 10:10)
1/2 tsp Salt (Leviticus 2:13)
2 tsps Baking Powder (Luke 13:21)
1/2 cup Water (Genesis 24:11)
1 tbsp Honey (Proverbs 24:13)

DIRECTIONS: Grease and flour a 9 1/2 inch tube pan. Chop nuts and fruits finely; flour well with part of the 2 cups of flour. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry; set aside. In mixing bowl blend butter, sugar, spices, and salt. Beat egg yolks and add. Sift in baking powder and flour; add water and honey. Stir in floured nuts and fruits; beat well. Fold in egg whites. Pour batter into pan. Bake at 375 degrees Fahrenheit for 50 to 60 minutes.

I invite you to open your Bible and enjoy the flavors and aromas of biblical cooking the next time you read your Bible, especially, when you pray, "Our Father, who art in heaven...Give us this day our Daily Bread..."

PER CAPITA

Near the close of the year, we begin looking at our finances and budget. One of the largest portions to take care of is the Per Capita. As of this printing, we have collected \$2,188.84 needed of our total due \$3,911.36. Balance remaining to collect is \$1722.52. If you have not already done so, please prayerfully consider making your per capita contribution by December 31.

WHAT IS PER CAPITA?

PER CAPITA has been part of our funding history for over 150 years. When presbyteries, synods, and the General Assembly meet, they are conducting the legislative and judicial business of the church and incur necessary expenses. There are also some necessary administrative expenses involved which enable these ecclesiastical, legislative, and judicial functions to be performed. Historically, per capita has been used to fund these. Importantly, per capita funding enables governing councils to make decisions regarding distribution of mission dollars without itself being funded by those same dollars.

The whole church shares in these expenses since everyone who is a member shares in the benefits of this system of church government. Per capita provides for the financial participation of all local churches as part of a connectional and representative church, thus providing for unity and mutual responsibility within the church.

HOW IS PER CAPITA CALCULATED?

The Per Capita Apportionment in the Presbytery of Lake Huron is based on a portion of certain salaries and expenses which are part of the operating expenses of the Presbytery.

Per Capita is the cost of being a Presbyterian, and if each member pays the per capita amount above his/her pledge or regular giving, pressure on the local budget is reduced.

Paying per capita is similar to:

- contributing one's dish to a potluck meal
- paying to be connected to the internet
- paying for the benefit of utilities, such as electricity, gas, water
- pitching in with others to pay for gasoline on a road trip

In order to keep presbytery's per capita rate from escalating the per capita portion of the budget is subsidized with a distribution from Presbytery's investments.

WHERE DO OUR PER CAPITA DOLLARS GO?

The amount that is set for per capita apportionment is a calculation based on the number of church members and the budget established annually by each governing body. At the presbytery level per capita pays for a number of items including:

- the mortgage payment on the presbytery office
- the office of the Stated Clerk including his salary and that of the Recording Clerk
- salaries of the Financial Secretary, Treasurer and the Administrative Assistant
- insurance coverage, legal counsel, annual audit
- costs associated with operating the presbytery office
- meeting costs for our standing units

SUNDAY SHEPHERD & USHERS

In order to make each Sunday's worship a wonderful experience for all. We are in need of volunteers for ushering and Sunday Shepherd duty.

Ushers pass out bulletins, collect the offering, get to ring the church bell, and light the alter candles.

The Sunday Shepherd oversees and monitors the safety of our congregation, and is responsible to call 911 in case of an emergency.

A look at the eighth scripture from the Presbyterian Foundation gives us insight on Loving God, loving our neighbor, and the greatest commandment.

From Luke 10:25-29 "On one occasion an expert in the law stood up to test Jesus. 'Teacher,' he asked. What must I do to inherit eternal life?' What is written in the Law?' He replied, 'How do you read it?' He answered: 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind and Love your neighbor as yourself.' 'You have answered correctly,' Jesus replied. 'Do this and you will live.' But he wanted to justify himself, so he asked Jesus, 'And who is my neighbor?'"



Jesus answers this question with the story of the Good Samaritan. Some version of the "Greatest Commandment" or the "Double Love Command" is found in all the gospels and this version in Luke concludes with the story of the Good Samaritan and is particularly fitting for reflecting on stewardship. This is the basis for Christian life, to love God and love our neighbors. We show our love to our neighbors by giving generously of our time, energy and resources, just as the Samaritan did.
