¹⁰ EASTER EGG MARCHI⁹⁹

The other day I was reading one of my devotional books, *A Pilgrim's Almanac*, by Edward Hays (1989), about the "Festival of the Easter Eggs." He comments this simple festival was first observed by European Christians around 700 A.D., and it was primarily a religious rite celebrated in people's homes. He notes many holy days or holidays are not necessarily celebrated in the church, rather they are celebrated in the home with special foods, decorations, and symbols (p. 74).

I remember in my childhood, helping my mother dye and decorate Easter eggs. I recall like it was yesterday, drawing crosses and writing my name with a white crayon on the shells of hard boiled eggs. I remember the stench of hot vinegar water where we dropped the eggs to change them into colored eggs. Once the kitchen timer went off my brother, my sister, and I would spoon the eggs from the colored vinegar water. We would observe our creative artwork of geometric designs, crosses, and letters spelling our names. Decorating Easter eggs was fun, and hard work. It took time to complete the necessary steps to create the finished product. Now, the one thing I didn't enjoy was eating those decorated hard boiled eggs. That was the one thing I couldn't stomach.

I couldn't stomach them until one day many years later I was humping (a.k.a. hiking) with Marines just a few days before Easter. You might say it was our "Easter" outing. As you may know from my different military stories Marines enjoy their nature "walks" whether they are a hike, a hump, a march, or a run. They enjoy being on the move creating and building camaraderie. I was grateful for this spirit of camaraderie because we shared a little Easter treat with one another in the Company. When we took our midmorning rest period we were instructed to go up and down the line sharing our special Easter treats. Let me tell you, the most loved person that day was a Marine whose wife and children dyed hard-boiled Easter eggs for his fellow Marines, his Navy Corpsmen, and his Battalion Chaplain. I couldn't believe it! This Marine with the help of some of his fellow Marine buddies provided us with old fashioned Easter eggs. To say the least, unlike my childhood, I didn't hesitate to crack my egg on the side of my helmet to peel back the shell. It had been a while since I ate breakfast.

I am touched how a mother and her children from their home kitchen provided us Marines with the sacred gift of the Easter egg. Edward Hays is right about the idea holy days begin in the home with special foods, decorations, and symbols. May you have a blessed Easter knowing the Festival of the Easter Eggs begins in your home.

Dear Church Family and Friends!

The Presbyterian Foundation has selected Ten Scriptures for Stewardship to help all churches and encourage congregations through this time. The scriptures help us to reflect on stewardship, generosity and gratitude. Each newsletter, we will highlight a new scripture.

Next up: From <u>Genesis 9:1-3, 16-17</u> (Noah, the aftermath of the flood and the rainbow.) Then God blessed Noah and his sons, saying to them, "Be fruitful and increase in number and fill the earth. The fear and dread of you will fall upon all the beasts of the earth and all the birds of the air, upon every creature that moves along the ground, and upon all the fish of the sea: they are given into your hands. Everything that lives and moves will be food for you. Just as I gave you the green plants, I now give you everything. ... "Whenever the rainbow appears in the clouds, I will see it and remember the everlasting covenant between God and all living creatures of every kind on the earth." So God said to Noah, "This is the sign of the covenant I have established between me and all life on earth."

This story is another reminder of God's generous provision to humanity. God provides for our basic needs and also establishes an everlasting covenant with us. Our response must be one of gratitude and generosity for this abundant provision. We can be inspired by the image of the rainbow and the reminder that God will provide for us, so we are called to respond generously to provide for the needs of others through stewardship.
