## "Celestial Celerity"

Summer becomes a time for many of us to travel and go on vacation. I always look forward to the summer months vacations. My vacation is traveling to places which are considered by others as insignificant or "off the beaten path." I often shy away from visiting popular tourist destinations.

I know my travels, adventures, and vacations "off the beaten path" have shaped me as a person. I know one of the greatest ways to explore is by reading, viewing films, and looking at photographs of places which I know I will never be able to personally visit. For example, space—the final frontier. Space exploration has always been a great interest. Astronomy is fascinating. I know I will never be able to travel to space in a physical manner, but I can surely travel to local planetariums, museums, and celestial observatories. Also, I know I can travel "off the beaten path" at nighttime away from all the bright lights of our surrounding cities like Saginaw and Flint, and neighboring towns, and venture out into the Thumb area and see with my naked eyes the spectacular star lit night skies of God's celestial celerity. This is what I call a vacation.

As you come and go in your travels this summer, please take time, and observe the impressive wonders of God's handiwork in our night skies. I think you will be amazed at God's original masterpiece. The 145th Psalm, and the beloved hymn, "How Great Thou Art," extols such awesomeness. Carl Boberb, a Nineteenth Century Swedish minister, wrote in 1885 a poem called "O Store Gud" translated as "O Mighty God." The words, literally translated to English, said: "When I the world consider / Which Thou has made by Thine almighty Word / And how the web of life Thou wisdom guideth / And all creation feedeth at Thy board. / Then doth my soul burst forth in song of praise / Oh, great God, Oh, great God! (Morgan, Then Sings My Soul, p. 213) This poem became the foundation of what evolved into our modern hymn, "How Great Thou Art." What shaped this poem into a hymn

was the cultural phenomenon of people traveling this world—observing God's handiwork in nature and society.

Enjoy your summer by observing God's celestial celerity.

- A list to help with donations for the Pasty fundraiser will be out soon.



## PER CAPITA

Thank you all that have made their contribution to the Per Capita commitment for this year. <u>As of</u> <u>the middle of May, we have received \$1,930.27 of</u> <u>\$3,098 needed.</u> If you have not had the chance to contribute, you still have until December 31. The rate for 2024 is \$29.50 per member.

#### WHAT IS PER CAPITA?

PER CAPITA has been part of our funding history for over 150 years. When presbyteries, synods, and the General Assembly meet, they are conducting the legislative and judicial business of the church and incur necessary expenses. There are also some necessary administrative expenses involved which enable these ecclesiastical, legislative, and judicial functions to be performed. Historically, per capita has been used to fund these. Importantly, per capita funding enables governing councils to make decisions regarding distribution of mission dollars without itself being funded by those same dollars.

The whole church shares in these expenses since everyone who is a member shares in the benefits of this system of church government. Per capita provides for the financial participation of all local churches as part of a connectional and representative church, thus providing for unity and mutual responsibility within the church.

#### HOW IS PER CAPITA CALCULATED?

The Per Capita Apportionment in the Presbytery of Lake Huron is based on a portion of certain salaries and expenses which are part of the operating expenses of the Presbytery.

Per Capita is the cost of being a Presbyterian, and if each member pays the per capita amount above his/her pledge or regular giving, pressure on the local budget is reduced.

#### Paying per capita is similar to:

- contributing one's dish to a potluck meal
- paying to be connected to the internet
- paying for the benefit of utilities, like electricity, gas, water

• pitching in with others to pay for gasoline on a road trip In order to keep presbytery's per capita rate from escalating the

per capita portion of the budget is subsidized with a distribution from Presbytery's investments.

#### WHERE DO OUR PER CAPITA DOLLARS GO?

The amount that is set for per capita apportionment is a calculation based on the number of church members and the budget established annually by each governing body. At the presbytery level per capita pays for a number of items including:

- the mortgage payment on the presbytery office
- the office of the Stated Clerk including his salary and that of the Recording Clerk
- salaries of the Financial Secretary, Treasurer and the Administrative Assistant
- insurance coverage, legal counsel, annual audit
- costs associated with operating the presbytery office meeting costs for our standing units

### STEWARDSHIP

Dear Church Family and Friends!

Thank you to all our Church Family and Friends that have helped increase the giving the last couple of months. The month of May was able to see a positive of \$1,178, above the needed budget amount. We so appreciate all your prayers and blessings!

The summer months tend to trend downward in giving and that is always a concern. Please consider helping out even if you are out of town or staying cool at home.

The Finance Committee, with some additional Elders, met on June 18, at 12:00 noon, to begin discussing budget changes. Many concerns and thoughts were voiced. A review of the expenses and budget are currently in process.

The main topic is to create the buffer in the check book that we had prior to 2023. Last year the Finance Committee set a goal of stabilizing the check book with a balance of \$12,000 for three months in a row. An added cushion would be helpful in slower months. We will remain focused on this as we continue to work on the other areas as well.

Please let us know if you have any concerns or ideas that can be discussed at our next meeting. The Finance Committee members are Lynn Hauk, Terri Rudzitis, and Judy Robertson. The next meeting is Tuesday, August 20, at 12:00 p.m.
