

VICTORIOUS LIVING

Happy Easter!

The joy of Easter is victorious living. Victorious living is two-fold: 1. Life Eternal, and 2. Life Worth. Life eternal means death is not the end—We live forever! Life worth means power to endure and overcome life's trials and tribulations—We live now! This is the Good News of Easter! Happy Easter!

The Apostle Paul writes: "I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death." (Philippians 3:10), and "I can do all things through him who strengthens me." (Philippians 4:13). These two biblical quotes sum up the Easter message in how we are to live today in the 21st Century just like the Apostle Paul lived in the 1st Century. St. Paul desires all Christians to be a true Easter people—a new kind of person with a new quality of life.

This new life embraces the power of Christ's resurrection with the notion of foreverness and worthiness. This is victorious living for the Apostle Paul, and it should be for us today. The Apostle Paul writes to the Philippians (and us) from prison stressing the joy of imitating Christ's humility when faced with life's hardships. Although life eternal is important for the Apostle, it is the hope of living a life worth living that St. Paul seeks for all Christians to beget in the power of the resurrection of Jesus Christ. To be an Easter people is to embrace the sacred and divine power of the Holy Spirit.

I have always remarked to people, both the churched and the unchurched alike, that the fullness of life is discovered and experienced in the resurrected Christ, in the fellowship of Easter. The joy of victorious living comes about in fellowship: "For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them." (Matthew 18:20). Let us all gather in fellowship as an Easter people living a victorious life not only on Easter Day, but every Sunday, which is Easter 52 times a year.




